meeting and a Sho-N-Tell time where you can show off your projects. Park on the street or across from Tobiason Studio.


January Meeting Notes

On a cold evening in mid-January, the Guild had our first meeting of 2025. Our group was smaller, probably due to the weather, but enthusiastic to get together. Lynn Anderson, Guild president, welcomed everyone and recognized one visitor who gave a brief overview of his woodworking experience and a desire to learn more about turning. Lynn asked treasurer, Rusty Cook, to tell the audience our financial position. Rusty reported that our bank account was in good shape with the annual cost of the website the only upcoming expense. Rusty also stated that the annual expenses for the Guild total about \$1400 and, that if about 50 people pay Guild dues, that will cover our expenses. That said, Rusty reminded the audience that Guild dues were to be paid in January and mentioned that several had paid before the meeting.

Lynn asked Jen Percell to tell about her experience at InspireU in December. InspireU, a 35,000 square foot discovery center for the entire family, is a new addition to the downtown area. Jen did a bandsaw demonstration at the soft opening on December 20. She and Lynn and Rhonda Anderson made Christmas ornaments using the bandsaw. Jen explained what she did and the space involved for the demonstration. She talked about the interaction with the InspireU participants, both children and adults. She stressed that more demonstrations are needed of many kind, not just woodworking. She encouraged others to contact Val Jones at InspireU to sign up for more demonstrations. Val's phone number is (816) 752-2228.

Jen is also working with the Sisters of Solace, a not-for-profit organization helping women survivors of trauma and addiction who may also be homeless. The organization has an area where Jen is building a shop to help some of the women to learn woodworking. She will be teaching the women to make small wood objects in general. She has managed to build eight workbenches and now needs some tools to use to teach. She mentioned sanders, sandpaper, clamps, a shop vac, small electric tools, and anything else that could be used to help teach the women. Anyone who would like to donate any tools and materials can contact Jen. Her phone number is listed with the other officers at the end of this newsletter.

Jen reported that there was a nice donation for the Christmas basket for Rick Tolbert. Ralph Alvarez said he and his wife have visited with Rick and he is improving. Ralph mentioned that Rick's medical treatment is completed and he is feeling good and regaining weight. He is beginning to get out an bit and his appetite is much better. We all wish the best for Rick and hope he can be back at Guild meetings soon.




Dean Fleshman — several homemade, carbide tipped, lathe tools along with a cutting board made of maple and walnut, and a distance gauge for the tablesaw.



January Program

Our January program was provided by Roger Martin on designing a small shop and an update on safety. Roger began asking the audience to think about the work flow in their shops. He stressed to understand the work flow, you must build something to see what you actually do. Building projects helps us to understand what we can do with the tools we have. He then talked about production and looking at the space needed

to build projects you want to build. He suggested, again, that we get in the shop and build something to see what we can do with the space and tools we have. By doing that, he said we can then look at production. As hobbyists, we don't need to do projects quickly, but to make our process smoother and less tiring. Roger recommended that we use the tools we have to build projects and see what tools are not used. Those tools can be sold or stored somewhere not in the shop and out of the way. Finish a project and see what space is needed. Roger then said the next step is maximization. He mentioned that putting mobile bases on tools help make the shop more effective. He gave a numerical system using numbers for the storage space, the tools, and the most common areas where work is done in the shop to help design the shop. Bigger is not always better and don't change too quickly were two ideas Roger gave to help provide the maximum use in the shop. After talking about shop design, he went over 11 safety notes to help remind the audience of continuing safe practices in the shop. The program was interesting and made us think of some of the things we do each time we are in the shop, Thanks to Roger for providing the presentation.
